2015 REPLAY QUIZ #1

- 1. F/K @ A-35. On the opening kickoff of the first half, Team A executes a surprise onside kick. Video clearly shows that A89 blocked B72 at the A-46 before the ball traveled ten yards and before it was touched by a Team B player, but officials do not call a foul. The kick is recovered at the A-47 by:
 - a. A82, resulting in A 1/10 @ A-47
 - Reverse to A F/K @ A-30. A89 is guilty of an Illegal Block (6-1-12), which is reviewable (12-3-4-e). The penalty is five yards from the previous spot. (See 2015 Replay Case #6.) *
 - b. B79, resulting in B 1/10 @ A-47.
 - Don't stop the game. While reviewable, there is no direct competitive impact involved. If the Team B coach wishes to challenge, Replay will reverse this to B 1/10 @ A-42. (See 2015 Replay Case #8.) *
- 2. F/K @ A-35. The score is A-28, B-35 with 0:47 remaining in the fourth quarter, and each team has one time out remaining. Team A executes an onside kick. Officials flag A89 for blocking B72 at the A-46 before the ball traveled ten yards and before is was touched by a Team B player; however, video clearly shows that the ball was at the A-45 when the block occurred. The kick is recovered at the A-47 by:
 - a. A82, resulting (after enforcement of the penalty) in A F/K @ A-30.
 - Reverse to A 1/10 @ A-47. A89's block was legal, and Team A was in legal possession of the ball at the end of the down. (See 2015 Replay Case #7.) *
 - b. B79, resulting (after enforcement of the penalty) in B 1/10 @ A-42.
 - Don't stop the game. While reviewable, there is no direct competitive impact involved. If the Team A coach wishes to challenge, Replay will reverse this to B 1/10 @ A-47. *
- * With the addition of Illegal Blocks by the Kicking Team to the list of reviewable plays, it would seem likely that the overwhelming majority of onside kicks recovered by Team A would result in a Replay stoppage. Conversely, Replay will not create a stoppage to review a potential Illegal Block when Team B recovers.
- 3. F/K @ A-35. On the opening kickoff of the second half, Team A executes a surprise onside kick which A82 recovers at the A-47.
 - a. Officials rule that A89 blocked B72 at the A-46 before the ball traveled ten yards and before it was touched by a Team B player, resulting in A F/K @ A-30. The Team A coach challenges the ruling that A89 committed an Illegal Block. Video shows that the ball was at the A-45 when the block occurred, but also shows that A82 touched the ball at the A-44 before it was touched by a Team B player.
 - Reverse to B 1/10 @ A-44. Team A retains their time out and challenge (if their first of the game) because A89's block was legal; however, A82 was guilty of Illegal Touching. **
 - b. Officials rule that A82 touched the ball at the A-44 before it was touched by a Team B player, resulting in B 1/10 @ A-44. The Team A coach challenges the ruling that A82 committed Illegal Touching. Video shows that A82 did not touch the ball, but also shows that A89 blocked B72 at the A-46 before the ball traveled ten yards and before it was touched by a Team B player.
 - Reverse to A F/K @ A-30. Team A retains their time out and challenge (if their first of the game) because A82 did not commit Illegal Touching; however A89 is guilty of an Illegal Block. **
- ** These plays are presented to review the enforcements and the proper handling of the coach's challenges. It is unfathomable that Replay would not stop to review these situations without a coach having to use a challenge.
- 4. 2/10 @ B-40. A15's pass to A86 falls incomplete. B37 clearly interfered with A86 at the B-32, but since the Umpire signaled that the pass was tipped, the Back Judge did not throw his flag and the result is 3/10 @ B-40. The Referee announces, "There is no foul for Defensive Pass Interference. The pass was tipped at the line of scrimmage." Video clearly shows that the pass was not tipped.
 - Reverse to 1/10 @ B-32. Touching of a pass is always reviewable (12-3-2-b), but the foul for Defensive Pass Interference can only be retroactively called with such a Referee announcement. (See 2015 Replay Case #54.)
- 5. 4/15 @ A-10. While A3's punt is in flight, B21 gives a "get-away" signal which is not detected by the officials. B21 catches the punt at A-45 and returns it to the A-25 where he is tackled, resulting in B 1/10 @ A-25.
 - Reverse to B 1/10 @ A-45. This situation was previously reviewable as a Case Book example of an egregious error; however, it is now considered specifically reviewable under 12-3-3-c. (See 2015 Replay Case #109.) Note that, in 2014 Replay Case #103, a foul for Delay of Game was prescribed, even when the advance was by the non-signaling player. No Delay foul is mentioned in the new play, even when the signaling player advances. So, it would appear that any thought of enforcing a five-yard penalty is now off the table.
